Waste-Free Ontario Act

Resource Recovery and Circular Economy Act Waste Diversion Transition Act

- Nine years in the making assented June 2016 anticipated to come into force late fall
- Informed by Waste Diversion Act failures, two bill attempts, and broader Canadian experience with EPR
- Climate change policy focus causes shifts from "waste diversion from landfill" to resource recovery as greenhouse gas mitigation strategy



• Resulting law is a circular economy omnibus

Major Design Shifts

- No transfer of responsibility/liability from individual "brand holder" to any other party (e.g., PRO or other service providers), which means:
- No shared responsibility
- No regulation of how objectives are achieved
- No stewardship plans submitted to government for approval
- No stewardship "programs" created through regulation (PRO convened through free association of brand holders)
- No regulation or oversight of financing of compliance activities
- No prohibitions or disclosure requirements related to visible consumer fees



Waste-Free Ontario Act





Objectives (as stated by MOECC)

Resource Recovery and Circular Economy Act

- Transform existing waste diversion framework to support circular economy
- Set overarching provincial direction and establish new producer responsibility regime

Waste Diversion Transition Act

• Ensure the smooth transition of existing programs to the new producer responsibility regime



Resource Recovery & Circular Economy Act



Described specifically in the Act – Principals that Guide Decision Making Provincial Interests are supported in a Strategy that the Minister is required to develop



Policy Statements

- Minister Issues
- · Approved by Lieutenant Governor in Council
- Certain persons/entities MUST have regard for these
- Existing Instruments must be made consistent

Creation of an Authority

- WDO transitions to the Resource Productivity and Recovery Authority
- Existing board terminated upon Royal Asset



Provincial Interests

Ontario has a system of resource recovery and waste reduction that aims to:

- protect the natural environment and human health;
- minimize greenhouse gas emissions resulting from resource recovery activities and waste reduction activities;
- minimize the generation of waste, including waste from products and packaging;
- decrease hazardous and toxic substances in products and packaging;
- hold persons who are most responsible for the design of products and packaging responsible for the products and packaging at the end of life; and
- increase the reuse and recycling of waste across all sectors of the economy.



Policy Statements

- Not regulations, sets policy direction, approved by Cabinet
- Certain persons MUST ensure that they act in a manner that is consistent with the policy statement when doing things related to resource recovery and waste reduction.
- Must be cross-referenced and considered alongside other existing policies, i.e., Municipal Act (Official Plans and bylaws); Environmental Protection Act; Planning Act; Environmental Assessment Act; Water Resources Act; etc.
- Minister will develop the policy statements in consultation with a variety of interested and affected stakeholders
- Review every 10 years



Marketplace Fairness/Competition

Competition Act (Canada)

8. Nothing in this Act shall be construed as requiring or authorizing any person or entity to engage in an activity that would constitute a contravention of the *Competition Act* (Canada).



Resource Productivity and Recovery Authority

- Dual functions
 - 1) Data repository
 - 2) Monitoring and enforcing compliance
- Transition of existing Waste Diversion Ontario
- Not a Crown Agency
- WDO Board is terminated on date of Royal Assent
- Governance:
 - Five Minister appointments
 - Six elected appointees
- Expertise and Experience
 - Resource recovery and waste reduction
 - Finance
 - Business Management
 - Compliance and enforcement
 - Corporate Governance and Management
- Functions under an operating agreement between Minister and Authority



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Resource Productivity and Recovery Authority

Key Functions:

- Sets and collects fees for the purpose of recovering its costs
- Operates a registry
 - entities such as producers, service providers (public and private), generators or agents, to register activities as it relates to the Act
- Registration information could include responsibilities within the Act or related regulation specific to waste reduction, collection, management, promotion and education, reporting and record keeping
- Appoints inspectors support compliance and enforcement
- Government may ask Authority to defray its costs associated with administering the Act



Responsible Parties

- Brand holders
- Commercial connection to waste
- Supplies convenience packaging (or has supplied but no longer does)
- Person who markets the product
- Person who performs an activity that relates to resource recovery and waste reduction (public or private service providers)



Responsibilities

Design

- Improve reduction and recyclability through design
- Reduce waste generated
- Reduce or eliminate use of certain substances
- Increase use of recovered materials

Collection

- Establish and operate a collection system
- Several specific requirements related to scope, access, standards, and coverage

Recycling Council of Ontario

Registry

- Receives information from obligated parties
- Provides public access to information (subject to regulation)
- Provides public notice of fees that will be established.

Can be used to collect:

- List or description of products and packaging
- List of persons retained to provide services
- Description of how that person is fulfilling or plans to fulfill their responsibility
- Other information that could affect resource recovery or waste reduction in Ontario



Oversight and Enforcement

Lieutenant Governor in Council Can issue regulations that disallow producers/brand holders who don't follow the rules from selling products into Ontario

Authority

Issues compliance orders; Orders imposing administrative penalties and offences Assumes oversight &enforcement of current IFO programs during their transition Conducts consultations Advises and reports to Minister

Powers of inspection

Establishes advisory councils as needed

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Environmental Review Tribunal Appeals made to compliance orders and administrative penalties

Non-Compliance

Administrative penalties \$20,000 daily

Offences \$250,000 daily

Authority/Registrar or Deputy Registrar

Province



Waste Diversion Transition Act



Waste Diversion Transition Act

- Sets up process where current programs under Waste Diversion Act transition under the new Resource Recovery and Circular Economy Act
- Through Minister's direction winds up current programs and Industry Funding Organizations, through the Authority
- Authority assumes oversight and enforcement of IFO programs
- IFO rules and authority to collect fees remain in place until they are officially wound up
- Minister may appoint an administrator to support the wind up process if Authority fails its duties
- IFOs are required to consult during their wind up process




Strategy
